

Greek Revival church has been a New Albany landmark since 1852 when it was completed by the congregation of the Second Presbyterian Church; the church is said to have been a way-sta tion on the Underground Railroad before the Civil War, aiding runaways with food, clothing, and other kinds of assistance.

National Cemetery - Located in New Albany on 5.5 acres 1943 Ekin Avenue, New Albany

812-948-5234 The New Albany National Cemetery was estab lished in 1862 to accommodate the burial of soldiers posted at the training center. By November 1870, more than 2,000 known dead and 698 unknowns were buried here. Placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1999

The openwebbed floor beams are one of the bridge's most unusual design features.
